Healthy You(th) Needs Assessment

- The Healthy You(th) (HY) program is designed to decrease adolescent pregnancy by providing medically accurate information, increasing confidence and self-efficacy, and improving decision-making among adolescents ages 12-19 in communities throughout Tennessee.
- The **goal** of the program is to serve approximately 8,000 youth, including youth who are living in areas with rates of high teen births and STIs; culturally underrepresented; in or aging out of foster care; involved in the juvenile justice system; homeless; parenting teens; and/or opportunity youth (i.e., youth ages 16-19 who are neither working not in schools).
- Several factors went into selecting counties to participate in Healthy You(th) including teen pregnancy and birth rates, STI rates, and systemic factors that are associated with higher teen pregnancy rates.
- Twenty-three counties are in the service area.

Birth and Pregnancy Rates

- More than half of Tennessee is considered rural (56.5%, n=39) and is 9th in the country for teen pregnancy rate and 10th in teen birth rate (15-19 years old).
- Tennessee averages 11.6 pregnancies per 1,000 females for 15-17 year olds and 56.6 for 18-19 year olds.
- In 2017, the <u>teen birth rate</u> among the state's 15-19 year olds ranked **6th** highest, at 27 births per 1,000, compared to the national rate of 19.
- The national birth rate is 7.2 per 1,000 females for 15-17 year olds, 32.3 for 18-19, and 17.4 for 15-19; whereas, Tennessee averages 9.6 births per 1,000 females for 15-17 year olds, 48.5 for 18-19, and 29.8 for 15-19.
- Compared to national averages, all but four counties (i.e., Chester, Haywood, Rutherford, Wilson) were significantly higher than the national average.

Sexually Transmitted Infection Rates: Chlamydia, Gonorrhea, and HIV

- Tennessee exceeded the 2018 national rate for chlamydia by 5.4% and gonorrhea by 21.7%,
- Tennessee's new HIV diagnosis rate ranked 13th in the nation.
- STIs are typically transmitted with risky sexual behaviors, such as unprotected sex—a behavior that is also associated with higher unintended pregnancy. Stigmatization around testing amongst this population may cause underreporting of STI rates.

Systematic Factors Associated with Teen Pregnancy

- 48% of teen females in <u>foster</u> <u>care</u> have been pregnant, and are twice as likely to have had sex and 33% more likely to not use contraception.
- One-third of females in the <u>juvenile justice system</u> either are currently or have been pregnant.
- Over 50% of public school districts serve <u>economically</u> <u>disadvantaged</u> children at rates exceeding the state.
- The unintended pregnancy rate among women with incomes below the <u>poverty threshold</u> are more than 5 times the rate among women with incomes at least twice the poverty threshold.
- 22% of TN Youth live in poverty and 6% live in <u>low-income houses</u> where no adults work
- Median income among households with children under age 18 is over \$11,000 lower than the national average
